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## **Exhibitors Honored at Dallas National Money Show®**

The American Numismatic Association presented competitive exhibit awards at its annual National Money Show to honor outstanding exhibits in several categories. The 2016 show was held March 3-5 in Dallas, Texas. ANA member Michael Ross received the Steven J. D'Ippolito Best-in-Show Exhibit award for his exhibit, "The Cathedral Medals of Jacques Wiener."

The second place Best-in-Show award was also presented to Michael Ross for "An Overview of French Feudal Coinage of the Middle Ages." Third place was awarded to Garry Moore for his exhibit "Token Appreciation: History of Hawaii's School Lunch Token Program."

The Radford Stearns Memorial Award for People's Choice, determined by votes from convention attendees, was also presented to Michael Ross, for "The Cathedral Medals of Jacques Wiener."

The National Coin Week Award was not presented this year, as no exhibits met the total-value restriction for exhibits in this category. National Coin Week exhibits are intended to be suitable for display in libraries and schools; a \$250 limit is placed on the value of the exhibits in this competition.

Radford Stearns Memorial awards were also presented in six classes. This year, 17 competitive and three non-competitive exhibits were displayed in the Collector Exhibits area by 17 exhibitors.

Class winners are as follows:

Class 1: History and Politics (exhibits dealing with historical or political events)

- First place: John Grost, for "Amilcar Cabral—A Portrait of Liberty : An Icon of Freedom."
- Second place: John H. Fryar, for "A Story of Money Around the Land of Enchantment."
- Third place: David Swann, for "The Mexican Revolution of 1910-1920 as Shown by Examples of its Paper Money."

Class 2: Economics (exhibits dealing with monetary and financial systems or economic events such as panics and inflations)

Class 6: Science (exhibits dealing with theoretical or applied science, including the technology of manufacturing numismatic items)

- Second place: Edward T. Arrich, for “Proof Franklin Half Dollars.”
